
A Journey into the Heart of Haiku and Senryu: **Exploring the Year of Japanese Verse**

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Another defining feature of haiku is "kigo" (seasonal word), which refers to a word or phrase that evokes a particular season of the year. The inclusion of kigo helps to ground the poem in a specific time and place, adding depth and context to the haiku.

Haiku by Matsuo Bashō

古池や 蛙飛び込む 水の音

English Translation

Old pond. A frog jumps in. The sound of water.

This famous haiku by Matsuo Bashō, one of the greatest masters of the form, beautifully captures the tranquility of a secluded pond disrupted by the sudden leap of a frog. The kireji "ya" (used in this case as an exclamation) serves to separate the tranquil setting from the unexpected action, while the kigo "furuike" (old pond) evokes a sense of history and nostalgia.

Senryu, also known as "comic haiku," shares many similarities with haiku in terms of its structure and form, but it differs in its subject matter. While haiku typically focuses on nature and the seasons, senryu often deals with human nature, social satire, and everyday life.

One of the key differences between haiku and senryu is the use of "hokku" (a verse consisting of the first three lines of a haiku) as a point of departure.

Senryu often incorporates a hokku as the first part of the poem, then adds a fourth line (7 syllables) to create a humorous or satirical twist.

Senryu by Karai Senryū

夫婦喧嘩 茶碗が一つ 二つに割れる

English Translation

Husband and wife quarrel. A teacup Breaks into two.

This senryu by Karai Senryū, the master of the form, humorously depicts the aftermath of a marital dispute, where a teacup becomes the victim of the couple's anger. The use of the hokku "fufu kenka" (husband and wife quarrel) as a starting point adds to the poem's comedic effect.

Haiku and senryu have had a profound impact on world literature, inspiring countless poets and writers across different cultures. Their brevity and simplicity have made them an accessible form of poetry, allowing readers to appreciate the beauty of language and the nuances of human experience.

In the West, haiku and senryu have gained popularity since the early 20th century, particularly among modernist poets such as Ezra Pound and Imagists like Amy Lowell. These poets were drawn to the form's conciseness and its ability to capture the essence of a moment.



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
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
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
