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Materials

To crochet a pair of men's fingerless camo gloves, you will need the following materials:

- Worsted weight yarn in two colors (one color for the main body of the gloves, and one color for the camo pattern)
- Crochet hook size H (5.00 mm)
- Tapestry needle
- Scissors

Gauge

The gauge for these gloves is 4 stitches per inch and 5 rows per inch. To check your gauge, crochet a 4-inch by 4-inch swatch using the main body color yarn and the H (5.00 mm) crochet hook. If your gauge is different, you may need to adjust the number of stitches you crochet for each row.

Instructions

To crochet the main body of the gloves, follow these instructions:

- 1. With the main body color yarn, chain 30.
- 2. Single crochet into the second chain from the hook and in each chain across. (29 stitches)
- 3. Chain 1 and turn.
- 4. Single crochet in each stitch across. (29 stitches)
- 5. Repeat rows 3 and 4 for a total of 40 rows.

To create the camo pattern, follow these instructions:

1. With the camo pattern color yarn, single crochet into the first 15 stitches of the current row.

- 2. Chain 1 and turn.
- 3. Single crochet into the next 14 stitches of the current row. (14 stitches)
- 4. Chain 1 and turn.
- 5. Repeat rows 3 and 4 for a total of 10 rows.
- 6. Cut the camo pattern color yarn, leaving a long tail for sewing.
- 7. With the main body color yarn, single crochet into the next 15 stitches of the current row. (15 stitches)

To repeat the camo pattern, follow these instructions:

- 1. Chain 1 and turn.
- 2. Single crochet into the first 14 stitches of the current row.
- 3. Chain 1 and turn.
- 4. Single crochet into the next 15 stitches of the current row. (15 stitches)
- 5. Repeat rows 3 and 4 for a total of 10 rows.
- 6. Cut the main body color yarn, leaving a long tail for sewing.
- 7. Repeat steps 4-6 to complete the camo pattern.

To finish the gloves, follow these instructions:

- 1. With the main body color yarn, single crochet around the edge of the glove, picking up both loops of each stitch. (80 stitches)
- 2. Join with a slip stitch to the first single crochet.
- 3. Fasten off and weave in all loose ends.


Your men's fingerless camo gloves are now complete! Enjoy wearing them during your next outdoor adventure.



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
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
